

Atelier Experiences

Age Group: Four's

Proposal:	Take pictures of your child doing different body positions. Print the pictures and invite them to represent their bodies in these different positions.
Materials:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Papers • Graphic tools (Pens, Pencils, Crayons, Colored Pencils.) • Camera • Printer
Milestones:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Language & Literacy (Listening & understanding, Speaking, Vocabulary) • Creative Expression Through the Art (Sensory Art Experience, Creative Movement, Imaginative & Creative Play, Appreciation of the Arts)
Tips:	<p>While doing this experience, ask your child:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • "What position is your body in?" • "How do your arms look?" • "Where is your leg?" • "Can you see your back?" • "Is your face frontal or sideways?"

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Proposal:	<p>Invite the children to explore the kitchen and provoke them to think about each tools purpose:</p> <p>What things can we find inside the kitchen? What is the name of the tool we cook our meals in? How big are they? which one is the biggest? Where do you bake a cake? What keeps our groceries cold or frozen? What kind of things can you find in there? What do you think about putting the milk or butter in the cabinets? YES/NO Why? Where do you place the dishes, cups, cutlery?</p> <p>Choose one artifact placed in your kitchen and draw and paint it</p> <p>The oldest kids can make a map of the kitchen.</p>
Materials:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Paper • Paint • Paint Brushes • Markers • Crayons
Milestones :	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Recognize and name things • Compare sizes. • Express themselves • Creativity • Increase vocabulary
Tips:	<p>Encourage the children to talk about the properties, helping them through questions. (Color, sizes. Material)</p> <p>For the younger ones, you can play to name the things that you find in a refrigerator. Things that you use for cooking breakfast or dinner</p>

Proposal:	<p>Pictures as prompts!</p> <p>Use a magazine picture and transform it into more complex artwork by drawing additional details.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Collect magazines or photographs • Paste it on an area of your paper • Using the photo as a prompt, draw around the photo to create a masterpiece
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Materials:	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Paper• Magazine(s)• Drawing tools<ul style="list-style-type: none">○ Pens○ Markers○ Sharpies
Milestones :	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Approaches to Learning (Eagerness & Curiosity)• Mathematical Thinking (Patterns, Geometry)• The Arts (Creative Expression through the Arts)
Tips:	You can also use old photographs to give it a personal touch.
